Vacation Time

Vacation can be taken during the following experiences:

- 1. Continuity Clinic (CC)
- 2. Elective Rotation following a continuity Clinic week

All residents receive 3 weeks of vacation time.

Internal Medicine Block Rotation Schedule KEY:

- *All years consist of 4+1 block schedule. All rotations are scheduled at the primary training site, with possible (rare) exceptions for Away Elective rotations.
- **Outpatient percentages are estimated based on known practice patterns of the Attendings for the Specialty and Elective rotations.
- ***Refer to Participating Site information for site 1 6 in the ADS that will be assigned depending on chosen core rotation.
- 1. **Wards:** Residents provide general internal medicine inpatient care (non-critical care) in teams led by Associate Program Directors and Core Faculty Internal Medicine physicians. The cap number of patients per intern is 8 and they are on wards for four weeks.
- 2. **Specialty** rotations are scheduled in the following five specialty areas: one Mandatory Specialty (Cardiology) rotation during PGY-1, and two each during years PGY-2 and PGY-3.

The order of these four rotations is flexible and may be scheduled based on the interest and needs of each resident, e.g. for early fellowship planning. The resident may choose 4 of the following five specialty rotations to tailor their future needs.

Gastroenterology, Hematology/Oncology, Infectious Disease, Nephrology, Pulmonary Medicine

3. **Selective** rotations are either electives or specialty rotations. They may consist of any of the "Specialty" rotations listed above, or any of the following additional specialty or Ambulatory areas:

Endocrinology, Neurology, Rheumatology, Psychiatry, Geriatrics, Administrative Medicine, Sleep Medicine, Allergy/Immunology, Ambulatory Primary Care, Dermatology, Non-operative Orthopedics, Office Gynecology, Office Nephrology.

Note: Neurology is no longer a required "Selective".

- 4. **Continuity Clinic (CC):** The continuity clinic rotation" is made up of 9 weeks of clinic. It provides the resident the educational opportunity to evaluate and treat their own continuity patients as well as provides separate opportunity to treat acute "walk-in" patients.
- 5. **Emergency Medicine:** Residents participate as team members in the 60,000-annual- visit Emergency Department, with an emphasis on evaluating and assisting in the care of critically ill patients under the supervision of the attending emergency department physician.
- 6. **Tri-Lective:** The "Tri-Lective" in the PGY3 year is a rotation that a resident would consider if his or her future is in either Hospitalist medicine, Primary Care or Urgent care. This rotation allows the resident to experience Consultation Medicine, Emergency Medicine or any Ambulatory experience in the third year. The four weeks may be divided into 2 weeks of two each, or four weeks of one.
- 7. **ICU:** Residents provide care for critical care patients in teams under the supervision of in-house critical care intensivists.

- 8. Night Float/Admit: Night Float/Admitter rotation is a four-week inpatient rotation for PGY- 2 residents. The night float is now also the night admission PGY2 resident that admits 5 admissions, as well as cross covering for the patients of the four resident inpatient teams overnight. The two previous separate PGY2 resident s, (PGY2 Night Float and PGY2 Night Admitter) now will alternate with each other, 4 nights on and three nights off to minimize burnout. The rotation involves caring for patients with a wide variety of diseases including sepsis, pneumonia, congestive heart failure, stroke, and others. Residents will also be exposed to complications that may occur while patients are hospitalized. A faculty nocturnist is available at all time s for indirect supervision with direct supervision immediately available if need be. This rotation is for PGY2 residents only. Residents on this rotation are not required to attend morning report or noon conferences.
- 9. Float/Ward:: The PGY1 Float/Ward rotation is two weeks of day wards split with two weeks of Introduction to Night Float. The night float introduction starts Monday night through Friday morning from 6pm to 6am. The intern Night Float works closely with the PGY2 night float to allow the intern an introductory experience and orientation to the night float rotation before their second year for their well-being and confidence. The Float introduction is two weeks only.
- 10. **Night Admitter:** Night Admitter rotation is a four-week inpatient rotation **for PGY3 Residents**. This rotation will afford the opportunity to work as a nocturnist focusing on 8 admissions. The rotation involves caring for patients with a wide variety of diseases including sepsis, pneumonia, congestive heart failure, stroke, and others. The PGY3 admission rotation alternates with a second PGY3 resident with 4 nights on and three nights off as well to minimize burn out. A faculty nocturnist will be available at all times for indirect supervision with direct supervision immediately available if need be. This rotation is for PGY3 residents only. Residents on this rotation are not required to attend morning report or noon conferences.
